






Problem statement and background

- Are you aware what AYA means?
- Based on the National Cancer Institute definition, AYA (Adolescent and Young Adult) is an acronym that focuses on those diagnosed with cancer between the ages of 15 and 39. (Japan is the same.)
- AYAs CML patients are very few and scattered throughout the country.
- I was diagnosed with CML in 2005 at the age of 22.
- It took me a long time to meet my peers of my generation.









Implementation (I) Survey of AYAs CML

- A survey of patients, including AYAs, in Izumi was conducted in collaboration with Otsuka Pharmaceutical.(2023)
 - n=355(AYAs=43)
- AYAs had more access to CML information than other generations (especially on websites and SNS).
- 51% of AYAs said they were having trouble with "financial burdens (e.g., medical expenses) which is higher than any other generation.
- Current state of mind, those AYAs are less "positive" than other generations.
 - Positive=51%, Feel down(sad)=33%









Implementation (II) Online Meeting

- I initiated efforts to connect AYA CML survivors in Japan.
- COVID-19 provided an opportunity for everyone to be able to conduct online meetings.
- Two meetings were held since 2022, with 6 and 5 participants.
- Our meetings included survivors in their 20s and 30s who had been diagnosed with CML, as well as survivors who had childhood cancer.







Implementation(III)

They spoke of their troubles.



I suffer from thinning hair and always wear a hat.



I am taking TKI, so we must avoid pregnancy.

However, everyone was delighted to realize that their experiences were not unique to themselves, and they were happy to have met fellow survivors.







Result and Impact:

- They need the opportunity to share their experiences;
 - One of the AYAs members was a speaker at the 922 event in 2023.
 - Fellow students who went on to art school wrote stories about her experiences and wonderful illustrations for IZUMI's publications.
- In addition to our regular online meetings, we plan to meet face-to-face.







Conclusion and recommendation:

- AYAs CML survivors are few in every country,
 - and they likely share unique concerns specific to their generation.
 - and their concerns are often difficult to express to other generations.
- We encourage you all to provide opportunities for AYAs peers to make new friends as well.
